Although the historical context of raku pottery will be explained, the contemporary approach to the medium will be pursued. Slip glaze techniques and glaze application will be explored as well as the effects of pre- and post-reduction firing of the raku vessels. - 3. Pinch Pot (Combination of at Least 2)

- 4. Combination Pot Using 2 of the Above Techniques
- 5. Glaze One Piece White with Areas of Raw Clay Showing
- 6. Form a Piece with a Lid
- 7. Three Pieces of Your Own Choosing

Advanced:

- 1. Glaze One Piece White with Areas of Raw Clay Showing
- 2. Form a Low Bowl at Least 10 Inches Wide
- 3. Make Tracings or Drawings of Pots You Like; Marry or Unite Two of the Shapes into One Piece
- 4. Make a Piece Which Shows the Plastic Quality of Clay
- 5. Make a Piece Which Denies the Plastic Quality of Clay
- 6. Make a Fantasy Piece Influenced by Sea-Life Such as Shells
- 7. Make Three Pieces of Your Own Choosing
