COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A continuation of the exploration of skills and concepts involved in the creation of fine art prints addressed in Printmaking II. Techniques will be presented through demonstration, studio work, lecture and critique. Students who successfully complete this course will develop original work suitable for inclusion in a portfolio for transfer to a four-year program of study. This course is subject to a course fee. At the conclusion of each semester/session, assessment of the learning outcomes will be completed by course faculty using the listed evaluation method(s). Aggregated results will be submitted to the Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs. The benchmark for each learning outcome is that 70% of students will meet or exceed outcome criteria.

SEQUENCE OF TOPICS:

- 1. Introduction of goals and topics supporting an understanding of an expansion of processes explored in Printmaking II.
- Introduction of an expansion of the review of the history of printmaking introduced in Printmaking II, presented to provide a stronger basis for evaluating prints.
- 3. Introduction of concepts and techniques necessary for the creation of a color reduction relief print utilizing three colors.
- 4. Introduction of concepts and techniques necessary for the creation of a collagraph using the technique of color viscosity printing.
- 5. Introduction of concepts and techniques necessary for the creation of an edition of intaglio prints using a combination of any of the intaglio processes available in the studio.
- 6. Execution of a suite of 20 prints revealing a personal vision in printmaking.
- 7. Expansion of a personal portfolio of original work created in Printmaking II, demonstrating a grasp of advanced techniques introduced.
- Investigation of available options for further study of printmaking and/or exploration of requirements for a portfolio of original work for transfer to a four-year program of study in printmaking or a related area of artistic practice.

LEARNING MATERIALS:

Carving tools, linoleum blocks, copper plates, etching needle and burnisher, chip board, modeling paste, gesso, printmaking paper, vinyl gloves, rags.

Other learning materials may be required and made available directly to the student and/or via the College's Libraries and/or course management system.
