COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Using professional production equipment, students learn journalistic skills by researching, writing, editing, and producing short documentary-style news reports that examine local issues facing Montgomery County communities. They broaden creative styles and techniques for producing documentary style reports while meeting professional news standards and deadlines. Students submit written proposals, review rough-cuts for approval, and digitally edit their final stories for distribution via student, College and community-based media.
