## Montgomery County Community College MUS 170 Piano Class 1 1-1-2

## COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The first in a series of four classes designed to give students a complete orientation to keyboard skills. Piano Class 1 is ideal for those with little or no previous piano study. Students may begin their studies in higher level classes if they pass the prescribed proficiency test. To provide for the proper level of individual attention, the class size will be limited to 16. SEQUENCE OF TOPICS:

(Specific pace and repertoire of the class will be at the instructor's discretion.)

- 1. Course introduction
- 2. Topic 1 (2-3 weeks)
  - a. Keyboard orientation and proper physical positioning
  - b. Elementary keyboard notation
  - c. CDE material in both hands
  - d. Accidentals
  - e. FGAB materials in both hands
  - f. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
- 3. Topic 2 (3-4 weeks)
  - a. Major pentachord and triads
  - b. Eighth note material
  - c. Triad work
  - d. Staccato and pedal
  - e. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
- 4. Topic 3 (3-4 weeks)
  - a. The Major scale and key signatures
  - b. Dots in rhythm
  - c. Tonic and dominant harmonization (dominant 7<sup>th</sup> chords)
  - d. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
- 5. Topic 4 (3-4 weeks)
  - a. The minor pentachord and triads
  - b. Harmonizations and melodies in minor
  - c. 16<sup>th</sup> notes and compound meter
  - d. The subdominant in harmony
  - e. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
