SEQUENCE OF TOPICS:

(Specific pace and repertoire of the class will be at the instructor's discretion)

- 1. Course introduction
- 2. Topic 1 (2-3 weeks)
 - a. Review of I-IV-V in Major
 - b. Tonic-Subdominant-Dominant in minor (analysis and performance)
 - c. Introduce secondary chords and other seventh chords
 - d. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading, improvising, and accompanying
- 3. Topic 2 (3-4 weeks)
 - a. Analysis work including secondary chords and all seventh chords
 - b. More secondary chords material for performance
 - c. Black-key major scales and arpeggios
 - d. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
- 4. Topic 3 (3-4 weeks)
 - a. Continued work with the black key major scales and arpeggios
 - b. Introduction of secondary dominant harmonies
 - c. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
- 5. Topic 4 (3-4 weeks)
 - a. Continued work with black key major scales and arpeggios
 - b. Introduction of 9th chords and 6th chords
 - c. Solo and ensemble repertoire for reading and accompanying
