## Montgomery County Community College THA 106 Acting II: Scene Study 3-2-2

## COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a continuing exploration of an actor's tools of voice, body, and imagination. Students will expand on their exploration of script analysis to further their skills in character development. Students will discuss and explore the actor's tools and instruments through exercise work, scene work, and personal explorations. Students will be required to view live and/or streamed theatre performances.

## **REQUISITES:**

Students must have successfully completed THA 105 with a C or better or have prior experience or training in the art of acting (upon permission of instructor).

## SEQUENCE OF TOPICS:

All classes will include warm-up exercises for body, voice and imagination. Each class will emphasize a particular concept or skill.

- 2. Review of Fundamentals: Improvisation; Identifying Beats, Objective, Obstacle, Conflict, Tactics, and Given Circumstances
- 3. Tools of the Actor's Imagination: Sense Memory, Emotional Memory, Substitution
- 4. Personal Exploration: The "Private Moment"
- 5. Introduction to various styles to expand methods of working. Styles may include Stanislavsky, Hagen, Meisner, M. Chekhov, and Laban
- 6. Preparing for Scene Work
- 7. In-Class Rehearsals
- 8. Personalizing the Work: Text Analysis as an Actor's Tool
- 9. Personal Exploration: Creating the Theatrical Event ("Universe Project")
- 10. Viewing and Critique of Monologue and Scene Work
  - a. Observation

- b. Aesthetic value
- c. Analysis

11. Demonstrations thru Specific Stage, Film, and/or Television Examples
