At the conclusion of each semester/session, assessment of the learning outcomes will be completed by course faculty using the listed evaluation method(s). Aggregated

results will be submitted to the Director of Educational Effectiveness. The benchmark for each learning outcome is that 70% of students will meet or exceed outcome criteria.

SEQUENCE OF TOPICS:

Course time consists of lab hours designated to the mounting of a specific theatrical production. Each class will emphasize a particular concept or skill, with the application of that skill in the production process.

- 1. Course Overview, Production Goals and Collaboration
- 2. Types of Theatres and Their Parts/The Design Process
- 3. Communication: Design and Production Meetings, Rehearsal reports, daily calls, etc...
- 4. Producer's Responsibilities, Organizational Structure, Management Methods and Techniques
- 5. Developing an awareness of target audience
- 6. Director's Vision and Concept Statement
- 7. Stage Management Duties, Responsibilities and Methods
- 8. Tools Safety and Usage
- 9. Stagecraft Techniques Basic Woodworking, Metal Working, etc.
- 10. Costumes Shop management, Plots, Measurements, Alterations, Budgeting
- 11. Scenic Construction Flats, Platforms, Soft Goods, etc.
- 12. Properties Plots, Research, Procurement, Budgeting
- 13. Technical Drawings Reading and Generating
- 14. Load-in, Strike, Post-mortem
- 15. Evaluation of the Process, the Production, and the Individual's Contribution.
